The annual dues of this Society are \$10 for the year or \$50 for 10 years. The Annual Meeting is held on or before the third Tuesday of November and to vote at the annual meeting, memberships must be purchased prior to the annual meeting of the current year.

MAHNOMEN COUNTY FAIR OPEN CLASS INFORMATION

Non-Livestock: Entry days are Wednesday, June 25th from 3:00-6:00 PM AND Thursday, June 26th from 9:00-11:00 AM. Judging will take place on Thursday after 11:00 AM. Exhibits can be picked up Sunday, June 29th from 8:00-10:00AM.

<u>Livestock:</u> Entry is Thursday, June 26th from 9:00-10:00 AM. Bring animals to the barn for registration. Check the fair schedule for livestock judging times. Animals can be removed Sunday, June 29th between 8:00-10:00 AM.

Entry Day Instructions Non-Livestock-

- Enter through the front gate, you may park in front of the Open Class Building while unloading but you will need to move the vehicle afterwards.
- 2. Go to the Open Class building and fill out paperwork and wait for tags to be made and placed on items.
- Registration closes at 11:00 AM Thursday, June 26th, NO EXCEPTIONS.

REGULATIONS

- Entries, except 4-H and FFA, will be open to any resident of Mahnomen County, all bordering counties, and all counties in the State of Minnesota that reciprocate in keeping their fairs open to Mahnomen County exhibitors.
- The Society will not assume any responsibility for (disease, sickness, injury) loss or damage to exhibits incurred during the fair.
- 3. No person will be permitted to distribute advertising matter on the grounds except from their place of business or exhibit. The tacking or posting of any advertisements, or distribution of bills, cards, flyers, etc. except within the area occupied by the exhibitor is prohibited. Anyone violating this rule will be liable to fine and expulsion from the grounds as the Board of the Directors may elect.
- 4. If for any reason whatsoever the general receipts of the Society are reduced or diminished, then the Society does not guarantee full payment of premiums listed in this book.

- The management will not be responsible for typographical errors in this book, but should any occur, they will be interpreted by the Board of Directors.
- 6. The Board of Directors reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these Rules and Regulations.
- Any person knowingly violating any rules of this Society will thereby forfeit all rights to any premiums that may be awarded to them.
- 8. Non-livestock items judged in 4-H cannot be also judged in Open Class. If multiple items are made, such as cookies, they may be exhibited in both 4-H and Open Class. Must be able to be displayed in both exhibits.

THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS RESERVES THE FINAL AND ABSOLUTE RIGHT AT ANY TIME TO REFUSE ENTRIES, OR PROHIBIT THE EXHIBITION OF ANIMALS OR ARTICLES ENTERED.

ENTRY PROCEDURES & EXHIBITS NON-LIVESTOCK

Wednesday, June 25th 3:00-6:00 PM & Thursday, June 26th 9:00-I I:00 AM

- I. All entries must be made on or before the first day of the fair. ALL ENTRIES MUST BE MADE AND EXHIBITS IN PLACE BY 11:00 AM THURSDAY, JUNE 26th AND MAY NOT BE REMOVED UNTIL SUNDAY, JUNE 29th between 8:00-10:00 AM. DO NOT REMOVE ANY EXHIBIT UNLESS YOU HAVE CHECKED WITH THE SUPERINTENDENT OF THAT DEPARTMENT. If an exhibitor needs additional time, call 218-902-0445 to set up an appointment for collection. No article will be released without proper entry form.
- The Fair Board reserves the right to limit the number of entries if space is unavailable. The management will endeavor to arrange for space for all qualified exhibitors. However, if present accommodations are exhausted, the management reserves the right to close entries at any time.
- All entries must be entered in the names of the bona fide owners.
- No person shall enter an article that has heretofore been exhibited and a premium paid thereon in the same lot except in certain designated classes.

- All entries must be the property of the exhibitor and except in designated classes must be raised, grown, or made by the exhibitors within the last year.
- No article shall compete in more than one lot number unless otherwise stated.
- 7. Every article or animal must correspond in number and description with the premium list, and be in its proper lot classification to quality for premiums. Articles not listed may be displayed upon approval of the division superintendent. A request can be made to the Board of Directors to make provisions for additional classes or lots in succeeding years.
- No article or animal will be assigned a place on the grounds until entry has been made.
- 10. No collections shall be allowed space which is not neatly arranged and fully labeled. A duplication of varieties in any collection shall debar the collection from prize money.
- 11. The Board reserves the right to group like lots/classes to create competition. The decision of the Mahnomen County Agricultural Society is final.
- The Mahnomen County Agricultural Society reserves the right at any time to refuse entries or prohibit the exhibition or animals or articles entered.

NOTE - The Mahnomen County Agricultural Society will take every precaution in its power for the preservation of articles and stock on exhibition, but cannot be held responsible for any loss or damage that may occur in the delivery, exhibition, or removal thereof.

JUDGING (Non-livestock)

- Open class judging will begin Thursday, June 26th after 11:00 AM.
- The awards on entries shall be designated by ribbons or cards, as follows: Championship – purple; first - blue; second - red; third - white; unless otherwise stated.
- The superintendent of the division or some other person appointed shall assist as clerk and shall keep a record of the awards made. This record when completed shall be signed by the clerk and returned to the secretary.
- 4. The superintendent shall check to see that each article entered in the record book is present and properly arranged before the judge(s) proceeds to place the entries. If an article cannot be found, the judge shall be so informed.

- 5. Should any article be entered in the wrong lot and the error be discovered before the judging, the superintendent may make proper correction in the entry.
- Any interference by exhibitors to influence or dictate
 decisions of the judge(s) will be sufficient cause for
 excluding his or her entry from competition, and should be
 reported to the secretary by the superintendent of the
 division.
- All awards shall be made by comparison of the individual merits of the entries.
- 8. The superintendent of a division may request the judge to state the reason for awards if such a request is made by an exhibitor or spectator.
- 9. The decision of the judge(s) shall be final in all cases except when mistakes, fraud or misrepresentation not discovered at the time the award is made, is apparent. In such cases the Board of Directors decision is final.
- 10. An exhibitor may make a written protest of a decision of a judge to the superintendent of the division within three hours after the time the award was made.
- II. All protests shall be settled by the Board of Directors at a meeting when all parties concerned will be notified to appear.
- 12. No former prize winners are to be displayed before judging in the class is completed.
- 13. It is the policy of the Mahnomen County Fair to award ribbons to only the first, second and third places in each class.

PREMIUMS

- I. If possible, premiums will be paid when entries are picked up on the last day of the fair or at the discretion of the Board. Otherwise, premiums will be mailed as soon as possible after the last day of the fair. Wrong or incomplete addresses will delay processing. Any claims of premium error must be made to the Treasurer within 10 days after the mailing of premiums.
- Premiums will not be paid on articles (or animals) removed from exhibition before designated time on the last day of the Fair unless otherwise noted.

Where there is no competition, first premium may be awarded but money paid will be based on recommendations of the judge relative to the merit of the exhibit. No award will be made if the exhibit does not merit an award.

 Premiums will not be paid on articles (or animals) of inferior merit, regardless of the number in competition for a premium or no competition. <u>Livestock:</u> Entry day is Thursday, June 26th from 9:00-10:00 AM. Bring animals to the barn for registration. Check the fair schedule for livestock judging times. Animals can be removed Sunday, June 29th between 8:00-10:00 AM.

Livestock Exhibition Handbook

REQUIREMENTS FOR LIVESTOCK ORIGINATING FROM MINNESOTA:

Livestock known by the exhibitor to have an infection, communicable disease or to have been exposed to an infectious, communicable disease or to be from a quarantined herd may not be entered for exhibition. The Official Veterinarian will make general health examinations of all livestock the day of entry. Brucellosis and pseudorabies tests must be conducted prior to exhibition and a record of the test results on a test chart or intrastate Health Certificate must accompany the tested animal.

<u>WARTS OR RINGWORM</u>: The Official Veterinarian will inspect all livestock on the opening date of the exhibition & daily during the exhibition. The Official Veterinarian will order the immediate removal to a quarantine facility or removal from exhibition premises of any livestock with symptoms of infectious or communicable diseases. This includes livestock with warts or ringworms.

CATTLE: Examined on day of entry by the Official Veterinarian. No health certificate required.

SWINE: The previously required pseudorabies test will only be required for hogs originating from outside Minnesota or from one of the 10 counties with a phase 3 pseudorabies status. Hogs originating from outside Minnesota or from Rock, Nobles, Jackson, Watonwan, Waseca, Blue Earth, Martin, Faribault, Freeborn or Mower Counties in Minnesota must have a negative pseudorabies test. "Originated" means that all hogs born in one of the above 10 counties need to be pseudorabies tested.

GOATS: Examined on day of entry by the Official Veterinarian. No health certificate required.

SHEEP: Examined on day of entry by the Official Veterinarian. No health certificate required.

HORSES: No health certificate required. Coggins test on file in the Extension Office. Horse Helmet Policy: All 4-Her's

participating in any 4-H sponsored mounted activity are required to wear properly fastened ASTM/SEI approved protective headgear. Helmet use is required when mounted. This policy also extends to 4-H volunteers when they are working with youth in a 4-H volunteer role during mounted activities.

DOGS: Dogs over 6 months of age must have a certificate of "valid DHL-Rabies-Parvo Vaccination" issued by a licensed Veterinarian. Modified live virus vaccine and trimune accepted for 36 months, killed vaccine accepted for 12 months.

RABBITS & WATERFOWL: No health certificate required.

BOARD OF ANIMAL HEALTH RULES:

Cattle & Bison: breeding cattle, rodeo cattle and all cattle for exhibition must be officially identified upon movement from the herd to another location with certain exceptions. Records of cattle movements into and out of herds must be kept on the farm for five years.

Swine: Swine moving within the state must be officially identified with certain exceptions.



<u>FORAGE BUNDLES</u> - All bundles must be two (2) inches in diameter. Bundle ends should be evenly trimmed. Forage should have good color, maturity, and leafiness.

GRAIN BUNDLES - All bundles must be two (2) inches in diameter. Bundle ends should be evenly trimmed. Heads should be even. Leaves should be completely removed. Mature grain will exhibit best.

SEEDS IN JARS - Jars must be clear, quart glass jars. Seeds must be cleaned and all other material, weed or other crop seeds and broken seeds removed. Samples must be from the current or previous crop year. Fill jars. Jars will not be returned.

DEPARTMENT 10 – Vegetables, Herbs & Fruits

\$10 BEST VEGETABLE By Mahnomen County Garden Club

<u>BEANS:</u> Harvest before constrictions appear between seeds, when seeds are about half grown. Ends of pods should not be broken off in picking. Pods should be uniform. Pods may be wiped clean, but not washed. Leave stems attached.

<u>BEETS, CARROTS:</u> Root crops should be mature but not overgrown, pithy or coarse in texture. Tops trimmed off 1-1/2 inches above the crown. Side roots trimmed off but not the tap root. Roots carefully washed but not scrubbed. Do not clean by brushing as done in the past.

BROCCOLI: Heads should be dark or purplish green and compact. Avoid yellow flowers in the head. Stems cut about 5 inches from top of head.

CABBAGE: Stems cut about 1/2 inch below the head. Remove blemished or broken leaves but care should be taken not to peel the heads too much. A few outside wrapper leaves are desirable. Specimens may be washed.

<u>CAULIFLOWER:</u> Heads should be white, compact, and free of small leaves and ricy texture. Stems cut so as to leave 4 to 6 leaves. Outer leaves trimmed to 1- 2 inches above the white head. Use a soft bristled brush to remove dirt from heads.

<u>CUCUMBERS:</u> Pickling: select fruits 3-5 inches long. Specimens should be the same stage of maturity and uniform in size, shape and color. Slicers: select fruits that are straight, dark green, and 6-10 inches long. They should be uniform in size, shape and color. Leave stems attached.

KOHLRABI: Remove roots just below the ball. Remove all but the upper 4-6 leaves. Select specimens that are uniform, medium size, and not hard or woody. Skin should be easily punctured by a thumbnail. They should be cleaned, but not washed.

STORAGE ONIONS: Have specimens mature and thoroughly cured. The neck should be small. Do not peel to give a slick appearance, Only such outer scales that are broken or discolored should be removed. Small basal roots should be left intact but trimmed to a uniform length of 1/2 inch. Wipe or brush but do not wash. Cut tops 1 inch to 1-1/2 inches long.

BUNCHING ONIONS: Specimens should be peeled, 6-8 inches, tops trimmed, roots trimmed to 1/4 inch.

<u>POTATOES:</u> Tubers should be uniform in size, color & shape. Washing is permitted but do not blemish the skin by scrubbing. Avoid specimens with defects or disease. Clean, but not skinned.

RHUBARB: Select specimens that are straight, uniform and unblemished. Stalks should be pulled from the plant, not cut. Trim the leaf blade to about one inch above the stalk.

TOMATOES: Select fruits that are uniform in size, shape and color. Fruits should be perfectly shaped and free of cracks or blemishes.
